

## Purpose of Public Scoping Meetings

### **Air Force Requirements**

#### Training

- NTTR hosts "Red Flag" exercises
- NTTR provides a training venue for 5th-generation aircraft
- NTTR provides additional users such as other U.S. government agencies, state and local governments, and allied foreign governments a training environment
- NTTR is the Air Force's premier range for Tactics Development and Evaluations





### **Air Force Requirements**

#### Test and Evaluation

- NTTR provides a variety of configurations for advanced threat systems (i.e. radars, threat emitters)
- Provides combatrepresentative targets and buffer zones
- Infrastructure available to measure and record critical Time-Space-Position Information
- Ability to reproduce complex electronic warfare environments





## Air Force Land Withdrawal Needs

- LEIS proposed alternatives address 3 primary areas of need:
  - Increase Major Combat Operations test/training capability and alleviate scheduling conflicts
  - Enhance Irregular Warfare test/training capability
    - Development of insertion and extraction points
    - Overland navigation
    - Remotely piloted aircraft operations coordinated with ground teams
  - Increase NTTR operational security and safety



## Air Force Land Withdrawal Needs


- Ready Access
  - Adequacy

- Ready Access does not mean exemption from applicable laws and regulations





### **Warfare Environments**


- Major Combat Operations
  - Desert Storm
  - "Red Flag" Exercises
- Irregular Warfare
  - Vietnam, Iraq and Afghanistan
  - Small Units such as Special Operations (SEALS, US Army Rangers and Delta Force)
  - Insertion and extraction activities, overland navigation and use of Unmanned Aerial Systems




















### Why NTTR?

- 2014 Congressional report
- Replication of NTTR infrastructure would cost \$4 Billion
- Cleanup of NTTR would cost \$1-4 Billion
- Total to cleanup and replicate NTTR elsewhere would be between \$5-8 Billion





## NTTR Land Withdrawal Proposed Alternatives

Proposed Alternative 1 – Extend Existing Land Withdrawal and Management of NTTR (North and South Range) – Status Quo

Proposed Alternative 2 – Extend Existing Land Withdrawal and Provide Ready Access in the North and South Ranges


Proposed Alternative 3 – Expand Existing Withdrawal of Public Lands for the NTTR

- Alternative 3A Range 77 Electronic Combat (EC) South Withdrawal
- Alternative 3B Enhance Operational Security and Safety 64C/D and 65D Expansion
- Alternative 3C Alamos Withdrawal

Proposed Alternative 4 – Establish the Period of Withdrawal

- Alternative 4A 20-Year Withdrawal Period
- Alternative 4B 50-Year Withdrawal Period
- Alternative 4C Indefinite Withdrawal Period


## Proposed Alternative 2 – Extend Existing Land Withdrawal and Provide Ready Access

- Extend existing land withdrawal and provide Ready Access in the North and South Ranges
- Methods of implementing Ready Access
  - Removal of Proposed Wilderness designation
  - Reallocation of primary jurisdiction
  - Development of a binding Memo of Agreement
  - Enactment of legislation



## Proposed Alternative 3 – Expand Existing Withdrawal of Public Lands for the NTTR

- Includes the current NTTR boundary, plus various options for additional lands needed for operational requirements
- Three proposed sub-alternatives that include ready access:
  - Alternative 3A Range 77 EC South Withdrawal
    - EC South area would be redesignated as "Range 77"
    - Increase the NTTR boundary by approximately 18,000 acres to add buffer to the safety footprint of Range 77
    - No construction disturbance or munitions use would occur in this proposed withdrawal area
  - Alternative 3B Enhance Operational Security and Safety 64C/D and 65D Expansion
    - Withdraw approximately 57,000 acres along southeastern NTTR border
    - No munitions use would occur in this proposed withdrawal area
  - Alternative 3C Alamos Withdrawal
    - Withdrawal approximately 227,000 acres of Desert National Wildlife Refuge under the Alamos airspace
    - Provides safety buffers associated with existing targets





## Proposed Alternative 4 – Establish the Period of Withdrawal

- There are three proposed sub-alternatives for the length of the new withdrawal period
- The anticipated new withdrawal period would begin November 5, 2021, but is subject to subsequent act of Congress
- The length of each sub-alternative is denoted in its name:
  - Alternative 4A 20-Year Withdrawal Period
  - Alternative 4B 50-Year Withdrawal Period
  - Alternative 4C Indefinite Withdrawal Period



### No Action Alternative

- National Environmental Policy Act requires the alternatives analysis to "include the No Action Alternative"
- Congress would not pass legislation to extend the military withdrawal
- If Congress does not extend the withdrawal, the military would discontinue use of the NTTR lands and the lands would revert back to the Department of Interior
  - Land would return to the Bureau of Land Management
  - No expansion of NTTR would occur

## Anticipated LEIS Major Milestone Schedule

- Aug 2016 to Dec 2016: Public notice of LEIS effort and Public Scoping Period
- Jan 2018: Draft LEIS released to public
- Jan 2018 to March 2018: Public hearings and comment period
- Sep 2018: Final LEIS released to public
- Nov 2018: Final case file/application package ready for submission to BLM
- The LEIS is programmatic and following Congressional action on the land withdrawal, site specific proposals would be evaluated with tiered or supplemental environmental review under NEPA
